## **Pastor's Corner**

## **Discovering the Secrets of Joy**

"There is only one piece of advice I can give you," says the wisest of wise men. "The secret of happiness is to see all the marvels of the world and to never forget the drops of oil on the spoon." (The Alchemist)

I have always found there to be a profound beauty in this excerpt taken from the Alchemist above; here the traveler arrives at a grand palace seeking wisdom. In order to prove he is worthy to receive this precious gift, he is given the task of taking a spoon with a few droplets of oil and walking all around the palace, preserving the oil on the spoon. The traveler does just that, but initially he misses all of the grandeur of the imported rugs, the magnificently detailed paintings that hung on the walls, or the majestic waterfall... He is asked to try again, and this time to observe the marvels of the palace that were missed the first time. He arrives back a final time, having seen the marvels and eager to tell of the marvels he captured with his eyes this time around, when the wise man asked him, "but what of the droplets of oil you lost?" The lesson is one of balanced priorities.

You know, in our modern culture, it feels like we have forgotten this simple but profound truth to living a fulfilled and joyful life. When did our society become so obsessed with the marvels of the world? We are crazed with more, much more, so much so that our politics have become reality tv, national disasters or tragedies are only tragic for a truncated 48-hour news cycle until the next big thing arrives, and to top it all, social media has insidiously become humanities' moral frenemy. We, on-mass, have become over-stimulated spectators, forgetting that the wonders or "marvels" we experience by themselves are inadequate for maintaining joy, unless filtered through a deep ethos of personal understanding and reflection.

This week I was reminded of the necessity of this balance. When amid the business of this season, life threw in one of its colorful distractions at the family. Initially, this was met with the understandable frustration of having too much to do to be slowed by such an unnecessary distraction.

Although when considering closer, perhaps life sometimes offers distractions as a time to pause from the busyness of life or to refocus on what is really meaningful and important. Regarding interruptions, we really have no choice; they come to us all. But regarding how we interpret them, there we have all the choice in the world; we can get angry and upset, or we can grow attentive and say, "God, are you trying to get my attention?" You see, I am convinced we all do it: we become so distracted on the treasures or necessity of busy life "working ourselves to death" as Alabama Shakes would term it, that sometimes we forget to manage those drops of oil on the spoon. Those little details that seem small and insignificant at first but are absolutely vital to the soul's nourishment, such as self-care, spiritual enrichment, and time with friends and family.

This holiday season, amid the busyness of life, would you take a portion of every day to stop, pause, and reflect, to be mindful of the tiny drops of oil? To consider what really provides joy in this season and, once discovered, be bold enough to share that truth and special gift with another.
